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Why Curiosity?

- If you're here, you know why.
- Meta-learning: the drive to learn
 - Not a specific domain
 - "Applicable" to all knowledge domains
- Information age: knowledge is within reach

Digital assessment and promotion

- Why digital?
 - Scalable
 - Objective and quantitative
- Why assessment?
 - To enable scientific and quantitative studies
 - To "benchmark" and "normalize"
 - Detect "abnormalities" and "disorders"
- Why promotion?
 - Curiosity is decreasing (with ?)
 - Promote and maintain high levels of curiosity
